



HEMISFAIR PARK

HemisFair Park was built to host the 1968 World's Fair. The Fifteen (15) acre park features cascading waterfalls and fountains, lushly landscaped areas, historic buildings, children's playground, and the world famous San Antonio landmark "The Tower of the Americas". In addition to the Tower of the Americas, shops and relaxing water features it is also home to the Universidad Nacional Autonoma de México, Instituto de México and the Institute of Texan Cultures, which offers year-round exhibits on the history and people of the Lone Star state and sponsors the popular Texas Folklife Festival each year.

McALLISTER PARK

McAllister Park is comprised of 986 acres on the north side of San Antonio between Jones Maltzberger and Wetmore Roads. The park's original 713 acres were purchased and developed using 1964 Bond funds and a Federal Open Space grant.

When the park officially opened on April 13, 1968, it contained four miles of trails, 125 picnic units, restrooms and parking areas. Current Park facilities include five miles of asphalt trails, more than 10 miles of unpaved natural bicycle and cross-country trails, picnic units, Little League baseball fields, and soccer fields.

Proposed Improvements:

Development, improvement and rehabilitation of the park to possibly include trail and roadway improvements and potentially the expansion of the dog park.



HARDBERGER PARK


Phil Hardberger Park, which opened in May 2010, is a 311-acre park located on either side of Wurzbach Parkway between N.W. Military Highway and Blanco Road. Hardberger Park is classified as a natural area, with amenities which include 1.5 miles of multi-use trails as well as access to the Salado Creek Greenway Blanco to Huebner segment near the Voelcker homestead which features an additional 1.7 miles of trail. Also open is the 1.8-acre dog park featuring areas for both large and small dogs. Picnic facilities and a large playground are also available.

Proposed Improvements:

Continued development based on the Park's Master Plan, to possibly include a Gathering Hall at the new Urban Ecology Center, for approximately 200 people with banquet style seating, completion of eastern portion of courtyard, parking expansion, and a traffic deceleration lane from NW Military Highway.



WOODLAWN LAKE PARK

Created as West End Lake in the 1880's, the lake and surrounding land were privately owned until 1918 when they were deeded to the City. The name was changed to Woodlawn Lake and many improvements and additions were made to the 62-acre park over subsequent decades. Today, Woodlawn Lake remains a popular gathering spot for visitors from throughout San Antonio. Residents use a walking trail daily, fish from the boat dock, swim at the pool, and play basketball in the gym. In the late 1990s the park became the site of the city's annual Fourth of July celebration, complete with fireworks and a parade. It continues to draw enormous crowds each year.

Development, improvement and rehabilitation of basic park infrastructure to possibly include improvements to the park's walking trail and East side playground area.
