In addition to funding, successful applicants will receive technical assistance from the funding agency in the planning, building, and maintenance of the play space. Projects will receive facilitation and support of an experienced project manager as community members embark on a 5- to 12-week planning process, after which they will invite children to design their dream play space. Projects will culminate in a six-hour community day, during which volunteers will transform the community play space.
