WELCOME

Accomplishments

Metro Health's innovative Healthy Neighborhoods, a place-based program to prevent childhood obesity—won a **Model Practice Award** at the 2019 Annual Conference of the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO). Community Health Workers Nora Gonzales and Jennifer Lopez-Garza accepted on behalf of the department.



Jacqueline Maldonado, RN with Metro Health's City Chest Clinic, was honored at the **4th Annual City Manager's Excellence Awards** in May 2019. The award represents the highest level that can be achieved in the City's employee recognition program, which highlights those who exemplify the City's CORE Values of Teamwork, Integrity, Innovation, and Professionalism. Jacqueline Maldonado demonstrated incredible caring and professionalism with an extremely infectious tuberculosis patient who threatened to expose the general public by boarding a long-distance bus ride. While juggling communications with city attorneys, the CDC, the Texas Center for Infectious Diseases and the Local Health Authority, she ultimately persuaded this young man to voluntarily enter treatment at our clinic.



In 2019 San Antonio became one of eight large cities across the country to achieve a **CityHealth Gold Medal** rating. CityHealth is an initiative of the de Beaumont Foundation and Kaiser Permanente that recognize cities for leading the way to pass policies shown to improve people's health and quality of life. The City of San Antonio was awarded the gold medal in 2019 for strengthening our Complete Streets policy, implementing the Healthy Food Procurement policy and for passing the Sick and Safe Leave Ordinance.



Public Health Accreditation

Metro Health is proud to be accredited. The Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) is the national non-profit organization that administers accreditation for tribal, state, local, and territorial public health departments. Public health accreditation is the measurement of a health department's performance compared to a set of nationally recognized and evidence-based standards, and the overall accreditation process is a department-wide quality improvement effort.

Communicable Disease

#IknowmystatusSA

In April 2019, the STD/HIV Program collaborated with City Council and numerous community partners to host the second annual **#IknowmystatusSA** campaign. The campaign's goal was to provide **4,000** HIV tests during National STD Awareness Month, decrease stigma surrounding HIV, and encourage people to adopt HIV/STD testing as a part of their routine health care.

- ▶ **4,467** sexual health screenings in April, in collaboration with City Council and community partners
- ▶ **100** testing events in April
- ▶ **21** new HIV infections and **92** new syphilis infections identified

Fetal Infant Morbidity Case Review Board

12 birth cases reviewed by Fetal Infant Morbidity Case Review Board, a multi-sector collaboration to address Bexar County's high rate of congenital syphilis.

Texas Vaccines for Children/Adult Safety Net Provider Conference

105 healthcare workers from **61** provider offices across Bexar County and **11** immunization partners and stakeholders attended the Texas Vaccines for Children (VFC)/Adult Safety Net (ASN) Provider Conference, hosted by Metro Health in June 2019.



Air Pollution Control: 1,171 facilities registered with Metro Health as part of the City's Air Pollution Control ordinance.



Stand Up SA program: Assisted over 300 families with food distributions at Eastside Education and Training Center.




Department employee engagement increased from 78% in 2018 to 82% in 2019.

FY 2019 METRO HEALTH REVENUES


(Adopted Revenues \$42.9M)

- ▶ The General Fund supports the Metro Health Department with \$4.3M.



FY 2019 METRO HEALTH EXPENSES
